# Alison Minns talks to Chris Dawes new Chair of The Friends

Can you tell me a little about yourself. I've always loved Brighton and Hove. My mother's family moved to Hove in 1930 and mv father worked in Shoreham. My parents met at the Regent Ballroom and we had family holidays in Hove. My parents moved back here when I went to university. It was only later that I began to appreciate its extraordinary architectural richness and, in my role in the Department for Culture, Media and Sport, did what I could to help preserve it. In a speech I wrote for John Major promoting the establishment of the National Lottery, he used my example of the West Pier as the kind of challenging project which only the Lottery could fund. My work sponsoring English Heritage and the Lottery Fund brought me a much greater appreciation of the merits of historic buildings and their importance, not only artistically but also in defining people's sense of identity with and appreciation for special places.

#### How long have you been a Friend ?

About three years. Having been a member of other local societies I discovered the Friends following its re-launch under my predecessor John Cox, and wanted to do a bit more myself to help preserve an important part of this city's heritage. What's so special about St Michael's? It's Grade I listed: about 2% of English buildings are listed and only 2.5% of those are Grade I. It's the only church in Sussex among Simon Jenkins' 100 best churches in England. There's enormous interest in art, as can be



seen by the popularity of London's blockbuster shows, but in St Michael's we have work of equivalent importance on our doorstep.

# What are you particularly looking forward to in your new role?

What's especially impressed me is how well the Church and Friends work together. Father Robert and his team go out of their way to make Friends' events possible. I've particularly enjoyed the annual dinner, fashion show and Indian evening. While the church does much to involve the community, the Friends' focus is on the outstanding

### David Beevers' Connoisseur's Tour Janet Barry reports

Notwithstanding being temporarily seated in penitential choir stalls, the Friends of St. Michael's had a splendid time at David Beevers' excellent Connoisseur's Talk on the beauties of the Burges designs for the church.

We were treated to informative and amusing anecdotes and guided through the intricacies of designing and decorating, in French Gothic style, the 'Cathedral of the back streets.'

Of especial interest were the carved capitals commemorating the rescue of two sisters during the Indian Mutiny (two figures with elephant and tiger above the pulpit, whilst opposite they are being greeted by their brother outside a city gate).

Those of the Friends who thoughtfully came equipped with binoculars had an excellent close-up view of the beauties of the carving. The detailed history behind this story is largely unknown and David Beevers suggested that it might make an interesting area of research for someone to follow up.

It was a measure of the appeal of David Beevers' talk that it even attracted one member of the Friends of St. Michael's all the way from the Isle of Wight! The session ended with a most enjoyable lunch of delicious home-made soup and splendid Sussex cheeses.

John, a resident of Powis Square for many years, held successive appointments as first director of production at Glyndebourne, artistic director of Scottish Opera and production director of the Royal Opera Covent Garden. He has directed productions in major opera houses across the world including San Francisco, New York, Sydney and Munich.

John will remain an active member but his leadership of The Friends will be missed.
